## **Fixture & Tournaments**

The new academic year has got off to a successful start with the PE department. We have seen personal achievements from Ava G (Y11) & Daisy G (Y10) who have both been selected to represent the Wiltshire Schools u16s in football.

The netball season has been full on with fixtures and tournaments for every year group. Some notable results;

Y8 boys have played in two development tournaments winning 5 matches and losing 2 matches. They have had a closely contested match against Lawn Manor coming away 39-25 winners. We await the outcome of the semi final.

# **EFL Utilita Cup**

A selection of girls U13 were invited to attend the EFL Utilita Cup at Foundation Park. The winners of the competition would represent Swindon in the regional rounds.

APS played matches against Wyvern, LPA, The Deanery, RWBA, Dorcan and Kingsdown. Up first was an inter-trust derby against LPA in which APS were victorious with a 2-1 win. This set the tone for the rest of the matches with wins against The Deanery, RWBA, and Dorcan. There was a closely contested draw against previous winners, Wyvern and a loss to Kingsdown 1-2.

These results put APS into the semi final against Commonweal. A bit of a one sided affair with a 4-0 win, a hat trick from Amelia and a goal from Kiki.

Into the final against Kingsdown. Having lost to them 1-2 already APS had something to prove. The game played out a 1-1 draw which meant penalties.



Unfortunately APS lost 3-2. However, despite the initial disappointment the girls played some great football and should be really proud to get to the final.


# **Music Lessons**

## St Paul's Cathedral, London

The excitement rose as pupils saw the top of the dome of the Cathedral and were eager to go inside and explore.

As we entered the Cathedral we first saw the font. This was bigger than expected and had images of Jesus and Mary with candles for tourists to light in memory of a loved one. Pupils then headed straight down to the crypt to explore some of the art work and exhibitions.



### Safeguarding information


At Abbey Park we are committed to ensuring a culture of safeguarding in our school and it is paramount in all we do. We hope that our termly safeguarding update will give you an overview of our approach, offer some useful guidance and information and inform you of what your child is learning in school about how to keep themselves safe. For more information about safeguarding, please look at our website:

### What does Safeguarding look like at Abbey Park?

At Abbey Park School we follow the Government policy document 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. This is statutory guidance for all schools in England to follow and comply with. It has recently been updated and therefore our safeguarding policy has been updated to reflect this. You can find this on our safeguarding section on the school website. Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is **everyone's responsibility**. Everyone who comes into contact with children and their families has a role to play in making sure that children grow up having the best life chances. In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, all adults should make sure their approach puts the child at the centre of the decision making and that the best interests of the child are always considered. We believe that it is in the best interest of our children to have opportunities to learn how to stay safe both in and outside of school. Our safeguarding themes are woven into lessons across the curriculum, into assemblies and throughout daily life in school. Here are just a few examples of how we teach safeguarding at Abbey Park:

- Dedicated safeguarding team in school every day
- Pastoral support for each year group.
- Pastoral Support Assistants who have specialist training in supporting a child in their social and emotional needs
- Members of staff who have completed basic mental health training
- Mental health pupil ambassadors
- Mental health staff ambassadors
- A dedicated mental health lead Mrs Stevens
- Wellbeing Wednesday each Wednesday Tutor time looking at how to look after mental health
- Assemblies and lessons taught throughout the year, including but not extensively, anti-bullying, equality, diversity, fire, sun, children's safety, exploitation, sexual harassment and violence and online safety.
- PHSE curriculum covering how to be healthy, having healthy relationships and developing emotional literacy
- Online safety curriculum
- RSE (Relationships and sex education) curriculum
- Weekly tutor time reminders about staying safe in school and our expectations

If you need any support with your child, please contact a member of the safeguarding Team.



### Food bank and Boxes of Hope

We understand that times are incredibly challenging for many families right now, and making choices between essentials like food and electricity is a reality no one should have to face. Please know you're not alone, and there is support available. If you're finding things difficult, our Pastoral team is here to help—whether it's referring you to the local food bank or accessing a Box of Hope to ease the pressure. You only need to ask, and we'll do everything we can to support you with care and confidentiality.

### Social care or external agency involvement

# Special guardianship orders or unofficial care givers

### **Attendance matters:**

Research shows that there is a direct link between good attendance to school and better out comes for young adults.

If you are struggling with your child's attendance please contact your Child's Head of Key stage, PSA or Miss Anstee for support.

### First aid

Just a reminder that we can only offer first aid in school. We are not able to treat pre-existing conditions as we are only first aiders.

Paracetamol – we will not issue any paracetamol to pupils during P5 to ensure pupils do not take another dose at home.



The settings on an Android device allow you to set certain rules to help safeguard your child's privacy when they are using it. # HEALTH & WELLBEING

Children as young as 13 are attending 'smartphone rehab' following growing concerns over screen time. There are now help centers in the UK which deal with screen addiction for children and adults showing the seriousness of device addiction. The World Health Organisation (WHO) has officially recognised gaming addiction as a modern disease. The condition was confirmed as part of their International Classification of Diseases (ICD) which serves as an international standard for diagnosing and treating health conditions.

# LACK OF SLEEP

7 out of 10 children said they had missed out on sleep because of their online habits and 60% said they had neglected school work as a result. It is important that children get the sleep they need in order to focus the next day.

# LOSS OF INTEREST

Your child may become less interested in anything that does not include their device. You may notice that your child is missing school time and generally being less engaged with other activities in the home. It is important to discuss this with your child as soon as you notice a behaviour change.



# CONFIDENCE, SUPPORT & ADVICE

The Children's Commissioner report 'Life in Likes', explored how children aged 8-11 are using social media today. It showed that children are using their devices to speak to their online friends about their problems and seek acceptance and support, removing face to face interactions.

# APPS CAN BE ADDICTIVE

Apps have been designed with 'psychological tricks' to constantly keep grabbing your attention. One example of this is on the app Snapchat, where you can gain 'streaks' when interacting with your friends. If you don't respond, you lose the streak. This addictive nature of apps aims to engage children and keep them coming back for more.

# LIMIT SCREEN TIME

In today's digital age, technology is an important part of a child's development so completely banning them from their device will mean they are missing out on a lot, including conversations and communication with their friends. Rather than banning them from using their devices, we suggest setting a screen time limit. Work out what you think is a suitable and healthy amount of time for your child to be on their device per week. Remember that your child may need to use devices for their school homework so only set screen limits on recreational time on their device. Once you have established this, have the conversation with them to discuss why you are implementing a screen limit. There will be others in your child's friendship group who will not have screen limit set and will be sending messages when they do not have access to their phones.

# LEAD BY EXAMPLE

# LESS TIME MEANS LESS EXPOSURE

There are many risks associated with devices, such as cyberbullying, grooming, sexting, viewing inappropriat content etc. Less time spent on a screen means that a child will be less exposed to these risks.

# MOBILE-FREE MEAL TIMES

Have you tried to settle your child by giving them a tablet at the dinner table or restaurant? This may seem like a quick fix to calm them down but in reality, it is encouraging them to use their device as a distraction from conversation and dealing with their emotions. We suggest removing all technology from the dinner table and having conversations with your family about how their day has been.

# REMOVE DEVICES FROM THEIR BEDROOM

Setting a rule about removing devices from bedrooms will help your child to get the sleep they need and be more focussed the next day at school. 20% of teenagers said that they wake up to check their social network accounts on their devices. Even by having a device switched off in their bedroom, they may be tempted to check for notifications.

# ENCOURAGE ALTERNATE ACTIVITIES

It may seem like an obvious solution, but encouraging children to play with their friends, read a book, or playin outdoors will help them realise they can have fun without their device. Playing football, trampolining camping, going for a walk or swimming are all healthy replacements for screen time. Try to join them in their Outdoor activities to show your support.
